



Teachers conquer the wild

THREE Coolamon teachers have returned home from a gruelling trip to the Blue Mountains after competing in the Wild Endurance marathon.

Jo Holgate, Michael O'Neill and Nadine Lucas from Coolamon Central School competed in the mixed category of the 100-kilometre event where they placed third in a time of 27 hours and 38 minutes.

All teams endured tortuous conditions with the event track resembling a swamp in many parts, and competitors having to cross creeks in waist deep water after torrential rain fell throughout the event.

"We had better conditions in the respect that it wasn't anywhere near as cold and windy as last year, but it rained the whole time," Holgate said.

"We were walking through water and mud the whole event, we had leeches, we had creek crossings up to our waist which was horrendous in that respect."

She said despite battling the conditions, the team was confident it finished in better shape than last year.

"We were glad we competed again even though it took us half an hour longer than last time due to the conditions we were walking in," she said.

"We were pretty pleased with our efforts and our support crew was fantastic as ever."

"It was fairly enduring because there were more than 50 teams entered in the 50-kilometre event and 31 were unable to finish.

"If one person pulls out, you have to join another team and

your team doesn't get to finish.

"We came third in the mixed category and out of 20 or so teams that started the 100-kilometre walk, only seven finished intact, so we were pretty impressed with

that."

Holgate added that organisers did a fantastic job with the track throughout the event.

"Wild Endurance deserves a huge congratulations," she

participants should be applauded.

"To be part of such an event is inspiring and the enormous 'buzz' that we've gained from being involved is fantastic.

"We had the same support crew of Chris Guthrie and Jody Lucas and they were exceptional again."

Event manager Sarah Williams said it was a phenomenal performance by the team under the conditions.

"It was easily the worse conditions we've ever faced and it was a massive effort for the teams to complete the event," Williams said.

"Local runners, who are experienced with the event route, said they had never seen conditions this bad."

"It was like a swamp in several areas while the competitors were in waist deep water at Bedford Creek."

"Competitors left Dunphys Creek in Megalong Valley on Saturday morning under threatening skies, and it wasn't too long before the heavy rain fell."

Conducted by the Wilderness Society, the event attracted over 340 competitors and raised almost \$150,000.

Part of the money raised will go to Science for Wildlife to track and save koalas in the Blue Mountains.

The money will assist with the purchase of GPS tracking equipment and collars plus the training of koala detection dogs.
